Notes:

Psalm 15

Imagine the scene: a group of pilgrims makes its way to the entrance to the temple in ancient Jerusalem and asks a question about who may enter to worship, and the priest gives an answer.

The psalm is both part of a worship service and a lesson. There are ten rules for ethical behavior.

Behind the question about entry is the understanding of the sanctuary/temple as a place of divine presence that is both threat and promise of life, so the question is about who might receive the gift of hospitality from this powerful, life-giving presence.

The central concern is not so much about individual acts as it is about ethical living, especially in terms of human relationships.

For the faithful, entering the holy place brings security, for the place of the divine presence is the secure place of the rock. God and the temple are solid and do not move. The wicked shall be moved (Ps.10:6), and even the faithful fear that they will be moved or shaken (Ps. 13:4), but God and the sanctuary are stable. It is the divine presence that provides protection and stability. The portrait of the holy place in the first psalms is as a place of refuge. God's presence is both demanding and life-giving. The hope of temple worship and its encounter with the life-giving God make possible faithful and vibrant days for ancient Israel as a community.

Questions for Reflection

How do we live in hope of a reality we cannot yet see or, at best, catch only fleeting glimpses? Where in your community's life of prayer and service do you see instances of God's justice, peace, and healing? Then give thanks, and ask God, Where am I being called to do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly into all blessedness in the ordinary course of my day?

Daily Awareness Reflection²

At the end of the day, I've been asking myself the following questions. I jot down the answers and ask them again the next evening. I've found it helps me to remain centered as well as increasing my awareness of God in my life. It takes about 10 minutes.

1. Slow down. Stop. Prepare yourself to pray by becoming aware of the love with which God looks on you ...
2. Note the gifts God has given you today. Give thanks to God for them ...
3. Ask God that this be a time of special grace and revelation ...
4. With God, review the day. Look at the stirrings of your heart, your thoughts, and your choices as the day progressed. Which have been of God? Which have not? What does God want to say to you about both? ...
5. Ask for forgiveness for failures/omissions, for healing from their effects ...
6. Look forward to the following day, and plan concretely with God how to live it according to God's desire for your life ...

Annual Meeting, Sunday, January 29, 11:15am

The Brookline Community Church will be holding its 2023 Annual Meeting in person on Sunday, January 29, 2023 at 11:15 am. The meeting will be preceded by our regular worship service at 10:00 am. The primary purpose of this meeting will be a review of church operations in 2022 and a faithful conversation about how our finances and church leadership structure can best be aligned with our ministry and mission moving forward. We will also vote on: a proposed change to Article II of the Constitution, to clarify the status of the assets of the Brookline Community Church in light of our two denominational affiliations; the nominations to our boards; and the 2023 budget.

This discussion and vote are part of the church's ongoing discernment of what God is calling us to do and require a quorum to transact this business.
