How do we define sin and the role of Adam?

Scripture Reading: Romans 5:12-14, p. 798

Reader One: Therefore, just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, and so death spread to all because all have sinned—

sin was indeed in the world before the law, but sin is not reckoned when there is no law. Yet death exercised dominion from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sins were not like the transgression of Adam, who is a type of the one who was to come.

Congregational Reflection on Scripture

Scripture Reading: Romans 5:15-19, p. 917

Team Adam: But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man's trespass,

Team Jesus: much more surely have the grace of God and the free gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many.

Team Adam: And the free gift is not like the effect of the one man's sin. For the judgement following one trespass brought condemnation,

Team Jesus: but the free gift following many trespasses brings justification.

Team Adam: If, because of the one man's trespass, death exercised dominion through that one,

Team Jesus: much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness exercise dominion in life through the one man, Jesus Christ.

Team Adam: Therefore just as one man's trespass led to condemnation for all,

Team Jesus: so one man's act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all.

Team Adam: For just as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners,

Team Jesus: so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous.

Why is Paul so hung up on sin when writing to the Romans?

Reader Four: But law came in, with the result that the trespass multiplied;

Where is the gift for Lent?

Scripture Reading: Romans 5:20b-21, p. 917

Reader Five: but where sin increased, grace abounded all the more, so that, just as sin exercised dominion in death, so grace might also exercise dominion through justification leading to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Reflection on the Scripture:

Hymn: [Grace Wins by Matthew West](#)

Prayer of Confession as our prayer to go back out into the world

Leader: Happy are those whose sin is forgiven,
who no longer suffer in silence,
but name their sin and seek God's grace.
Let us confess our sin.

**All: Wild God of the Wilderness,
you know the ways of good and evil.**

**You know the things that tempt us
and the things that give us life.**

**You know our nakedness,
The fruit we eat when no one is watching
and you know our sin.**

**We confess that we have disobeyed your word,
denying your providence and care
and relying on our own cleverness.**

Leader: Happy are those whose sin is forgiven!

Notes:

Psalm 32

Psalm 32 is divided into three parts, with the middle having the most interest. The psalmist announced the conclusion at the beginning. Namely, for a full life, there is nothing like being forgiven. The psalm does not trouble over the question of a life free of transgression. It assumes transgression. It has observed the killing burden of sin unforgiven, and it knows that forgiveness is the power for new life.

The middle part of the psalm states the movement concisely: paralysis (vv. 3-4), acknowledgment (v. 5), rescue and well-being (vv. 6-7). Everything in disorientation, everything for future life, everything in relation to God – everything depends on confessing to God. This psalmist understood the need for spoken release and admission, the liberation that comes with actual articulation to the one who listens and can respond.

There is no doubt here about the reality of God, the reality of accountability, the clarity of expectation, and the need to come to terms with that clear, unavoidable relationship. God is not an elective or a hypothesis, but a definitional and determinate partner who establishes norms and with whom we must deal. Freedom from guilt requires embracing it and having it dealt with by the mercy of God.

In verses 8-11, the one who has found this way to freedom wants to share it. We could be stubborn and miss the whole point. But the “narrow gate” to new life is the way of coming to terms with God, facing God’s holy will and the contrasting failure of our life.

The guilt to be acknowledged concerns our idol-making, which reduce all of life to management and reduces the terror of God’s holiness to a set of religious niceties. For what the psalm finally commends is *yielding*. Against that, our social values are oriented to *unyielding control*.

Household Prayer: Morning¹

Holy God, as this day surrounds me like a garden with a thousand trees, give me enough knowledge to obey your commandments, and to choose the fruit that gives life: the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

Household Prayer: Evening

Where can I hide from you, O God? You have found me here, stained with the fruit of desire, shivering in the evening breeze. This is all I ask: wrap me in your mercy, and let me rest in your presence; for the sake of Jesus Christ the Lord. Amen.

Questions for Reflection

How might you grow in faith and draw near to Jesus through the forty days of Lent? Let Jesus' three responses to the devil be your guide: (1) study Scripture (live by the Word of God; Matt. 4:4); (2) seek reconciliation with God and others (do not put God to the test; Matt. 4:7); and (3) be active and intentional about participating in the worship of your congregation (worship the Lord your God; Matt. 4:10).

Daily Awareness Reflection²

At the end of the day, I've been asking myself the following questions. I jot down the answers and ask them again the next evening. I've found it helps me to remain centered as well as increasing my awareness of God in my life. It takes about 10 minutes.

1. Slow down. Stop. Prepare yourself to pray by becoming aware of the love with which God looks on you ...
2. Note the gifts God has given you today. Give thanks to God for them ...
3. Ask God that this be a time of special grace and revelation ...
4. With God, review the day. Look at the stirrings of your heart, your thoughts, and your choices as the day progressed. Which have been of God? Which have not? What does God want to say to you about both? ...
5. Ask for forgiveness for failures/omissions, for healing from their effects ...
6. Look forward to the following day, and plan concretely with God how to live it according to God's desire for your life ...
