Notes:			

Psalm 128

The opening section of the psalm, verses 1-4, is framed by the phrase "those who fear the Lord." The psalm's opening word is often rendered as "happy." The term introduces an observation about living: one who walks or lives in line with God's purposes finds wholeness. It provides the parallel to the fear of the LORD in verse 1. In this phrase, "fear" is about reverence or awe before God, and the observation that whom one reveres, one obeys. To fear the LORD is to entrust all of life and hope to this one and follow the divine guidance.

Verse 2 illustrates such a full life in terms of everyday work. In the ancient world, labor was about growing food, and the enjoyment of that task was eating the fruits of one's labors. In verse 3, the grapes and olives were common to the life of ancient Israel and provided for daily life. Verse 4 ties these illustrations of work and family back to God's blessing. It is God who is present to make possible the vibrancy to grow and live fully.

The psalm concludes in verses 5-6 with a benediction, a blessing from God. God is present to bring about powerful growth and full living. The completion of that blessing is put in terms of *shalom*, or peace, but not just as the absence of conflict. The hope is for the encounter with the reign of God and the consequence of a healthy and full life for individuals and the community. The blessing is thus a gift from God rather than a human success, and is tied to both individuals and the nation; the two are bound together.

The psalm's conclusion is a benediction. The pilgrims receive a priestly blessing and hope to live out that blessing faithfully, based on the encounter with God in the sanctuary; they hope for a life that fits together in integrity, a life of peace.

Daily Awareness Reflection²

At the end of the day, I've been asking myself the following questions. I jot down the answers and ask them again the next evening. I've found it helps me to remain centered as well as increasing my awareness of God in my life. It takes about 10 minutes.

- 1. Slow down. Stop. Prepare yourself to pray by becoming aware of the love with which God looks on you ...
- 2. Note the gifts God has given you today. Give thanks to God for them ...
- 3. Ask God that this be a time of special grace and revelation ...
- 4. With God, review the day. Look at the stirrings of your heart, your thoughts, and your choices as the day progressed. Which have been of God? Which have not? What does God want to say to you about both? ...
- 5. Ask for forgiveness for failures/omissions, for healing from their effects ...
- 6. Look forward to the following day, and plan concretely with God how to live it according to God's desire for your life ...
