Scripture Reading: Exodus 12:1-14, p. 51:

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgements: I am the LORD.

The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

Notes:			

Psalm 149

This psalm is exceedingly problematic because, after a celebrative introduction (vv. 1-4), it combines "praise the Lord" with "pass the ammunition":

Let the high praises of God be in their throats And two-edged swords in their hands. (v. 6)

After this awkward combination comes a harsh statement about executing vengeance and punishment, about binding kings in fetters and merchant-lords in iron shackles (vv. 7-9). The psalm moves from a lyrical remembering of the exodus to a powerful resolve for the conquest, for the seizure of the land of promise. No doubt this theme of land conquest is an embarrassment for us because of its implied rapacious violence.

The psalm is a stunning example of how praise engenders public policy, public resolve, and public action. In a less benign form, this psalm is not unlike the great civil rights protests in the United States in the 1960s, which began characteristically in singing and prayer and thus gained courage for public testimony.

The action envisioned is not against any general population but is precisely against kings and merchant-lords. That is, it is action aimed against those who control a social monopoly and who thereby deny and deprive others of their legitimate goods for life. The worship of the God of exodus leads to energy and imagination for the righting of social wrong rooted in monopoly and oppression. The psalm is a harsh one; it is nonetheless clear evidence, that praise is deeply and directly linked to serious and critical public policy and public practice. And if this psalm turns out to be too dangerous to sing in our more bourgeois liturgies, then we may want to consider how such liturgy becomes innocuous and cuts God off from God's deeply rooted social intention.

- 1. Slow down. Stop. Prepare yourself to pray by becoming aware of the love with which God looks on you ...
- 2. Note the gifts God has given you today. Give thanks to God for them ...
- 3. Ask God that this be a time of special grace and revelation ...
- 4. With God, review the day. Look at the stirrings of your heart, your thoughts, and your choices as the day progressed. Which have been of God? Which have not? What does God want to say to you about both? ...
- 5. Ask for forgiveness for failures/omissions, for healing from their effects ...
- 6. Look forward to the following day, and plan concretely with God how to live it according to God's desire for your life ...
