### **Lighting the Advent Wreath<sup>2</sup>**

Several years ago Cláudio Carvalhaes, professor of worship at Union Theological Seminary, suggested that we lament before we light – naming those things which oppose or diminish hope, peace, joy and love. We name them and then claim the power of that light over them. Today's Advent wreath lighter is Rena Duncklee. [Let us bring light to the darkness.](#)

Leader: In our homes, we gather around wreaths to pray our lost hopes, broken peace, limited joys, and love so hard to find and share, in this season of coronavirus. We affirm that our candles mean we claim the power to call this season Advent when God's light comes into the world and nothing can overcome it.

Lighter: I light the candle of hope in the face of not having Thanksgiving with me family.

Emmanuel, God be with us, in the week to come, lighting hope on the wick of our lives so that we may shine on our world. Amen

Leader: God's hope shines on hopelessness, and brightens the path toward peace.

**Scripture Reading: Isaiah 64:1-9**

[Isaiah 64:1-9 [read for you](#)]

O that you would tear open the heavens and come down,  
so that the mountains would quake at your presence—  
as when fire kindles brushwood  
and the fire causes water to boil—  
to make your name known to your adversaries,  
so that the nations might tremble at your presence!  
When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect,  
you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence.  
From ages past no one has heard,  
no ear has perceived,  
no eye has seen any God besides you,  
who works for those who wait for him.  
You meet those who gladly do right,  
those who remember you in your ways.  
But you were angry, and we sinned;

because you hid yourself we transgressed.  
We have all become like one who is unclean,  
and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth.  
We all fade like a leaf,  
and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away.  
There is no one who calls on your name,  
or attempts to take hold of you;  
for you have hidden your face from us,  
and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity.  
Yet, O LORD, you are our Father;  
we are the clay, and you are our potter;  
we are all the work of your hand.  
Do not be exceedingly angry, O LORD,  
and do not remember iniquity for ever.  
Now consider, we are all your people.

### **Reflection on the Scripture:**

During this Advent that is going to be different from any other we keep or have kept in our lifetimes, I thought we might explore our connection with the book of Isaiah. Written at three different times: in exile, when news that they were allowed to go back to life as they knew it arrived, when they were back to the new normal and not finding it as easy as they had hoped, the book of Isaiah offers us an opportunity to look at our own lives and our own faith decide how we want to live into the future God offers while acknowledging what has brought us to this moment.

Today's reading from Isaiah is a prayer. It starts by looking back to the past, when God was so much more present in the world. The mountains quaked (Isaiah 64:1), the heavens were torn open (Isaiah 64:1). And we could sit together around a Thanksgiving table with folks who had just driven in. We could go to the Hollywood blockbuster that was opening in 500 theaters on Thanksgiving weekend. The question was whether the turkey was going to fit in the oven, not what we were going to do with all the leftovers. Especially when our brother-in-law didn't take the carcass back to his house to make soup. The prayer looks back to the past, we look back to the past, and we ask God to remember those times with us. The prayer looks back to the past even if it wasn't perfect, or rather, even though it was scary enough that people trembled in public (Isaiah 64:2).

Then the prayer does some introspection. The people praying the prayer aren't perfect either. They're sinners. They've made the world an unfit place for God to

come to visit.<sup>3</sup> It feels like God has been absent from the world and that might be part of how they slid off the straight and narrow. In English and Greek, a portion of the blame is laid squarely on God. In Hebrew, it's more circumspect.<sup>4</sup> But for whatever reason things have fallen apart, they've definitely fallen apart. Life is a mess. A big, hot mess. And there is no way out of blind alley leading to a dead end that they have fallen into. Political divisions, economic inequality, climate catastrophe. Whatever they called it, whatever we call it, we get it. We're in a terrible mess. One we made. One we can't get out of. One we need to get out of if we're going to have a future worth leaving to our kids.

The book of Isaiah looks at the political history of their country and asks a question about the future, given the past. This invasion here by that king then was met with this response over there. Then that guy died and his sons couldn't hold the kingdom together so it fell apart. But another king with other sons came and filled the void and he was a tough son of gun who liked to take names and conquer territory. And before you knew it, there was Jerusalem surrounded and then destroyed. And throughout all that, the kings of Israel tried A, B and C to keep the invaders out. It's a long telling and re-telling of conquest and defeat. Events that seemed like minor footnotes turn out to be hinges of history, but they could only tell that in retrospect. Decisions that tore the court in Jerusalem apart ended up not mattering much at all. Who Israel is at the end of all that history has completely changed from who they were at the beginning of it.

The book of Isaiah looks at all that history and turmoil and change and says, "and yet."<sup>5</sup> And yet, God was with us the whole way. And yet, whatever humans said or did in every convulsion from way back then to right here and now, whatever humans said, that was not the last word. God has the last word.<sup>6</sup> And yet, for all the mistakes we've made that have led to this blind alley, to this dead end, to this history that is petering out like a creek in the desert, and yet for all that, God is still with us. And God can do what God has done before, many times. God can reach into history and provide a new future.

That knowledge, that the former things of this world matter, but that the God of Israel can sever the connection, can give the people of Israel a new start, that is the heart of the book of Isaiah and heart of the prayer we read from Isaiah today. *Yet, O LORD, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand* (Isaiah 64:8). God can step in like a loving parent with

kids who have messed up but learned their lessons. God can step in like a potter and continue to shape the creation that is coming into being.<sup>7</sup>

We may be looking back to the past and wishing the present were more like that. We may be running around in the present, being large and in charge, trying to control the world with a rampaging virus in it as if that were even remotely possible. And the book of the Isaiah, the prayer from Isaiah says to us, “and yet”. Are we willing to stop, take a deep breath, acknowledge our own sins, our own iniquities, then say “and yet” and remember that the future comes from God?<sup>8</sup>

Do you hear the echo of the “and yet” from Isaiah in the prayer we pray all the time? “Father” we say. Give us a future that has daily bread in it. Give us a future that has forgiveness for trespasses. Give us a future where we are delivered from evil. We will acknowledge our past, but we ask for a future which is not connected to it. Because from long ago, you are our Father and we are your people. When we settle ourselves in prayer, we remember where our future comes from. Not from the past. It comes from the “and yet” God has offered us from the beginning of the world. We pray that God remembers that too.

So let us pray together...

Our Father who art in heaven hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil, for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory forever. Amen.

### **Questions for Reflection**

The weeks leading to Christmas are often filled with much activity. Along with work, school, and church responsibilities, there are special holiday festivities to which we will attend. Staying "awake," as Mark 13:24–37 stresses, may not be the problem—in fact, we may feel there are not enough hours in the day! Yet, this reading from Mark counsels us to be awake to, to pay attention to, what is most needful for our well-being and the well-being of the world: God's presence, God's appearing among us. Here at the beginning of Advent, how will you "keep alert" for God in the midst of so many responsibilities and distractions?

### **Daily Awareness Reflection**

At the end of the day, I've been asking myself the following questions. I jot down the answers and ask them again the next evening. I've found it helps me to remain centered as well as increasing my awareness of God in my life. It takes about 10 minutes.

1. Slow down. Stop. Prepare yourself to pray by becoming aware of the love with which God looks on you ...
2. Note the gifts God has given you today. Give thanks to God for them ...
3. Ask God that this be a time of special grace and revelation ...
4. With God, review the day. Look at the stirrings of your heart, your thoughts, and your choices as the day progressed. Which have been of God? Which have not? What does God want to say to you about both? ...
5. Ask for forgiveness for failures/omissions, for healing from their effects ...
6. Look forward to the following day, and plan concretely with God how to live it according to God's desire for your life ...
