Scripture Reading: Acts 19:1-7

[Acts 19:1-7 read for you]

While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the inland regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. He said to them, 'Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?' They replied, 'No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit.' Then he said, 'Into what then were you baptized?' They answered, 'Into John's baptism.' Paul said, 'John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus.' On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied— altogether there were about twelve of them.

Reflection on the Scripture:

Recently, it seems like the question I am asking most frequently is, "are you kidding me?" Or something profanely close to that. And yet here is Paul. He's in Ephesus, the fourth largest city in the Roman empire.³ There's so much potential there for Paul to share what it means to Walk in the Way of Jesus Christ because there are so many people from so many different places. He's come across a group of people who think they're Christians. They've been baptized. But somehow they've never heard of the Holy Spirit, let alone experienced it.

And instead of dropping an f-bomb on them, Paul asks questions. *Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?* (Acts 19:2) Nope, never heard of it. *Into what then were you baptized?* (Acts 19:3) Into John's baptism, they reply, as if John were a brand, like being a Ford guy rather than a Chevy guy.⁴

For John the Baptist, accepting baptism was accepting that your life needed to turn around. Your efforts were inadequate and you needed to try harder. And for John the Baptist, someone was coming later that would make all the difference for the folks who had turned their lives around. But for Paul, whose life had spun out of his control on that road to Damascus, he knew that the baptism of repentance wasn't the whole story. We take the first step and accept that our lives are a bit of a mess, we resolve to try harder. But after a while, when we rely solely on our own efforts, we realize we're not getting anywhere in our new direction.⁵ At some point, we realize that we need something more than ourselves, more than our own efforts. We need the grace of Jesus Christ to make the difference that our own efforts can't pull off.

When we enter into the true baptism of the Lord Jesus, when we accept the grace he offers, it becomes so much easier to Walk in the Way. The Holy Spirit comes upon us. We have patience that comes out of nowhere. We have a sense of humor that lets us reset when we're getting a little anxious. We can ask questions instead of just stomping around wondering what kind of idiots we're dealing with. And how can they consider themselves baptized with that kind of half-baked, cockamamie theology that doesn't even know about the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit is key to the entire operation, now that Easter and Pentecost have passed and Jesus has ascended.

Paul baptizes them and they speak in tongues and prophesy (Acts 19:6). They share what it is like to have passed through that first stage of repentance and self-reliance and into the new stage of accepting grace, of experiencing the Holy Spirit working in their lives. It's not necessarily a miraculous, walk-on-water kind of thing. But the Holy Spirit gives a kind of resilience, a kind of space that allows someone like Paul to go past the discouragement of thinking he might have met some Christians already only to discover that they have missed a really key part of the message.

This Sunday is our Annual Meeting, where we'll discuss the budget. And it will be a challenging discussion because we're in the middle of a challenging situation. If it were up to me, we'd have morning worship upstairs, where we'd sing together. Then we'd head downstairs for a potluck lunch, that will be the best lunch in town on Sunday. We'd sit in the Social Hall and talk things through, tease each other a bit, laugh with each other a bit, make a holy space of silence and time when someone shares something that's clearly important to their faith. If it were up to my own efforts, that's what an Annual Meeting would always look like.

But a pandemic doesn't allow that to happen this year. So we'll all be apart, trapped in little Zoom boxes. My lunch will not be nearly as good, even if I pull a Take Home Meal out of the freezer. We'll have the challenge of not talking over each other because of the latency with Zoom. And the budget will still be a challenge because it's a challenging year.

So my prayer for myself for annual meeting is to think about Paul in Ephesus, to think about my baptism in the name of Lord Jesus. As if I need any more reminding that it is not up to me, I'll pray that I remember that the Holy Spirit can provide so much more resilience and creativity, so much more insight and patience, if I'm willing to get out of its way. Paul had a huge, challenging job in front of him. Paul says in 1 Corinthians 16:9, I will stay in Ephesus until Pentecost, for a wide door for effective work has opened to me, and there are many adversaries. I don't know what was more appealing to Paul, the wide door or the many adversaries. I'll pray that I can be more like Paul. But mostly I will pray that I will ask the questions the Holy Spirit prompts me to ask, and leave aside the impatient questions that I would ask if it were just up to me. Because it is not just up to me. It is up to all of us. The Holy Spirit isn't kidding any of us about how much we can do together when we are willing to rely on God and each other.

Questions for Reflection

What is the difference between baptism with water alone (John's baptism; see Acts 19:3, Mark 1:8) and baptism with the Holy Spirit (baptism into Jesus; see Acts 19:4–5, Mark 1:8)? Why is it still important to use water in baptism? What does water mean in your daily life? What difference does the Holy Spirit make in baptism? What difference does the Holy Spirit make in your daily life?

Daily Awareness Reflection⁷

At the end of the day, I've been asking myself the following questions. I jot down the answers and ask them again the next evening. I've found it helps me to remain centered as well as increasing my awareness of God in my life. It takes about 10 minutes.

- 1. Slow down. Stop. Prepare yourself to pray by becoming aware of the love with which God looks on you ...
- 2. Note the gifts God has given you today. Give thanks to God for them ...
- 3. Ask God that this be a time of special grace and revelation ...
- 4. With God, review the day. Look at the stirrings of your heart, your thoughts, and your choices as the day progressed. Which have been of God? Which have not? What does God want to say to you about both? ...
- 5. Ask for forgiveness for failures/omissions, for healing from their effects ...
- 6. Look forward to the following day, and plan concretely with God how to live it according to God's desire for your life ...
