Sacrament of Communion

Invitation to the Table

Leader: Jesus calls all people to sit at table with him:
the sick and the uncertain,
the weak and the poor,
the Pharisees and tax collectors.

From north and south and east and west he calls us
to come and sit at this table,

On a night long ago, when Jesus sat at table with his disciples,

Words of Remembering

Leader: You are holy, O God of power and might,
and blessed is Jesus Christ, the one who comes in your name.
In his life, he called unlikely people to follow him:
fisherfolk, tax collectors, children,
sinners, deniers, betrayers.

On the cross he gave himself up to the powers of this world,
showing in his body your great foolishness, O God,

for loving such a wayward world.

Yet by this very cross, O Wisdom from on high,
you have undone and remade the wisdom of this world,
drawing light from darkness, power from humiliation,
life from death itself.

Remembering your gracious acts in Jesus Christ,
we proclaim together the mystery of faith:

- All: **Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again.**
Leader: Come, then, life-giving Spirit, brood over these bodily things
All: **and make us into one body with Christ,**
that we, who are baptized into his death,
may walk in newness of life;
Leader: that what is sown in dishonor may be raised in glory
All: **and what is sown in weakness may be raised in power.**

Prayer of Consecration

- Leader: The psalmist knows that when we turn to God, we find mercy. God offers love that is completely gratuitous; God seeks only our well-being. So often we deny others the mercy and love God offers us. God forgives and invites us to turn again, to try again, to begin again. And we know that if the expectations of our lives are swept aside, we have a table from God, a meal not made with hands, that feeds us hope and steadfast love.
- Leader: Rest your hands lightly upon your elements of Communion. We ask God's grace on us and on all those who are in our prayers this morning and God's blessing on our elements and our hands.
- All: **God, in whose open hand we place our own, whether we have met you long ago or in this very moment, we pray that you send your Spirit of life and blessing upon all of us gathered anywhere, in any way, so that this Bread may be broken and received in love and this Cup poured out to give the world hope. Risen Christ, as you have faith in us, may we have faith in you. Breathe in us, that we may breathe in you. Amen.**

Sharing of the Elements

- Leader: We are welcome to this gift of God, the Bread of Heaven.
All: **We are Christ's family in the Bread we share.**

- Leader: We are welcome to this gift of God, the Cup of Blessing.
All: **We are Christ's family in the Cup we share.**
[Drink from the cup.]

Leader: Let us pray in thanksgiving for this meal of new covenant. In the beginning of time, your wisdom danced through creation, calling forth light and life. Through wisdom, you formed us in your image, calling us to love and serve you.

and you nourished us with manna and water from the rock.

Scripture Reading: Mark 6:1-13

He left that place and came to his home town, and his disciples followed him. On the sabbath he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astounded. They said, ‘Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary and brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?’ And they took offence at him. Then Jesus said to them, ‘Prophets are not without honor, except in their home town, and among their own kin, and in their own house.’ And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them. And he was amazed at their unbelief.

Then he went about among the villages teaching. He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. He said to them, ‘Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them.’ So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

Reflection on the Scripture:

Have mercy upon us, O LORD, have mercy upon us, for we have had more than enough of contempt. Our soul has had more than its fill of the scorn of those who are at ease, of the contempt of the proud (Psalm 123:3-4). My argument about getting better acquainted with the psalms is that they will help us put into words something we're experiencing today. And with those words, we can more easily turn to God in prayer.

At this moment, 245 years after the founding of our country, those words hit hard. We have had more than enough of contempt. Our soul has had more than its fill of the scorn of those who are at ease, who are proud. The Hebrew for “more than its fill of scorn” uses the word for “throat” or “neck”. The image is that we’re so full of other people’s contempt that we don’t have room to breathe. Rather than being full of nourishing food, we’re choking on scorn.¹ The inability to breathe connects with all sorts of images that come out of today’s news, George Floyd being choked to death, the limitations on free speech, the hundreds of thousands of Covid deaths. So yeah, those words hit hard. Have mercy upon us, O LORD, have mercy.

Maybe because we're so full of other people's contempt, so full we're choking on it, part of the reading from Mark hits hard too. *If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them.* (Mark 6:11). Oh, man, do I have a whole list of people to shake my dust at. I can give you list alphabetically or in order of priority. And the list gets longer every day. I have a temporary handicap pass for my car while my knee is so painful. I can tell you I will aggressively shake dust at anyone who leaves a shopping cart in a handicapped spot.

And yet, given all the other stuff Jesus said, I'm pretty sure that I'm not being sent out into the world to shake dust. I'm pretty sure we're being sent out to proclaim that folks need to turn their lives around (that's what "repent" means) (Mark 6:12). We're being sent out to heal folks (Mark 6:13). Because we're being sent out with the authority that Jesus gave us (Mark 6:7). We're being sent out not to say what we think. We're being sent out to say what Jesus said.² After that, we can add that loving our neighbor is hard, especially when they leave shopping carts where we want to park.

Jesus knew that not everyone was ready to hear God's wisdom, to receive deeds of power (Mark 6:2). Jesus had done a circuit in the area around Galilee, preaching and teaching, recruiting disciples. He had come home to Nazareth, to the people who had raised him, to the people who knew him best. We can speculate why he was there, but it was clear he was there as a teacher, with his disciples. He hadn't come home just for a cooked meal and do his laundry. I think he wanted to offer some of the mercy, some of the grace he had found in God. Because regardless of what his community said, he laid hands on people and cured them (Mark 6:5).

There's a clear implication that Jesus could have done more in Nazareth, if the people there had only believed. But it's also clear why they didn't believe Jesus had anything to offer. They thought they knew him so well. He was Mary's son, they knew his whole family, he was a carpenter, not a rabbi (Mark 6:3). He was just an everyday guy from the village. Someone as ordinary as the boy next door, whose brothers and sisters you know is not going to be where God shows up. Because they knew what we know. God does not work through the commonplace.³ God works through the exotic and the marvelous. The people from Nazareth were astounded he would even make the claim (Mark 6:2).

And Jesus is amazed at their unbelief (Mark 6:6). Because he knows what they have, in part because he grew up there. They have community. They have the ability to come together and rely on each other. When he sends his disciples out, he tells them basically they can only go with the clothes on their back. He's

forcing them to go, two by two, to different villages and bring a message about the Kingdom of God. The message is certainly the stuff about loving God and loving your neighbor. But it's also a message about being vulnerable, about taking care of the weakest among them, about caring for the image of God in the stranger. And that message comes because they have to rely on others for food and shelter.⁴ Their resources aren't the bread or money in their belts (Mark 6:8). Their resources are the commonplace hospitality of strangers and their obedience to God. And the message is that God works through the most ordinary of messengers, who show up willing to rely on the hospitality of strangers.

When God sends us out in the world, our authority comes from our obedience to Christ's message. Yes, Jesus cautions us about relying too much on the clutter of things that would rob us of our authority.⁵ Our authority does not come from our power or wealth. Our authority does not even come from our success rate, our results. We are not to force ourselves on other people or assume some kind of responsibility for their decision.⁶ Jesus tells us to shake the dust off our feet not because we get to choose who is outside the circle of God's love. Jesus tells us to shake the dust off our feet to remind us that it is God's mission, not ours. It is the people to whom we offer our witness that have to decide to accept it, not ours.

When our soul has had more than its fill of the scorn of those who are at ease, when we are full up with the contempt of the proud, God offers us mercy. God offers us a reminder that our resources do not accomplish the work of God.⁷ Regular, every day, commonplace people like us count because of the authority God conferred on us by Jesus Christ. That's why God dares to send us out. That's why we dare to go. That's why remarkable good still comes. The good comes through the obedience of inadequate, commonplace messengers.⁸ Who are choking on the dust of the proud who are at ease. God gives us permission to walk out of that dust storm, to continue to share the message of Jesus Christ. Thank you for that mercy, O LORD, thank you.

All: **We want to be people of hope, living in a world that revolves around mercy, not one driven by contempt.**

Leader: In this coming week when it will be so easy to reach for power in our relationships,

All: **Help us to look to you, and to offer mercy to those around us.**

Leader: Amen.

All: Amen.

Notes on Psalm 123

The psalm rotates and spins, opening up space for God's New Thing. The psalm begins with God enthroned in heaven. Turning to earth, the psalm points at a servant, at a maid, who are watching their masters. Their glance is not full of suspicion, fear, dread or resentment; the prayer would not work as a prayer that way. Instead, the look is one of awe, dependence and glad submissiveness, all rooted in trust.

The psalm turns again, urging us to look to God the way the servants are looking to their master. We should look for mercy from God because, as our master, God offers love that is completely gratuitous. God gives Godself over to the well-being of God's servants.

What a way to think of prayer, as a recharacterization of social relationships with the God of mercy as the defining reference. The prayer presents humiliated people, like us, turning from the ones who are "at ease" to the one "enthroned in heaven." With that turn, we depart from contempt and embrace of mercy. The God of mercy thus is presented as the alternative and antidote to unbearable relationships and social inequity.

The prayer is an immense act of hope, a conviction that demeaning social relationships are not the norm and need not endure. The voice of such hope grows out of urgent need, but the grounds of such hope is in the one addressed, the God of all hope, who will, sooner or later, turn the world to well-being, even for those whom the world holds in contempt.

Questions for Reflection

Stuff distracts us. Useless clutter we think we cannot live without can be a burden: too many coats, shoes, garden tools, or mismatched kitchen storage containers with no lids in sight as they tumble out of overstuffed cabinets. Perhaps our clutter shows up in other ways: on a computer that has grown slow from processing too many useless files, or when our minds grow dull from too much Web surfing or television viewing. Do you struggle with too much stuff? How do Jesus' words about traveling light challenge you to change the way you live? How can you follow him more faithfully today?

Daily Awareness Reflection¹⁰

At the end of the day, I've been asking myself the following questions. I jot down the answers and ask them again the next evening. I've found it helps me to remain centered as well as increasing my awareness of God in my life. It takes about 10 minutes.

1. Slow down. Stop. Prepare yourself to pray by becoming aware of the love with which God looks on you ...
2. Note the gifts God has given you today. Give thanks to God for them ...
3. Ask God that this be a time of special grace and revelation ...
4. With God, review the day. Look at the stirrings of your heart, your thoughts, and your choices as the day progressed. Which have been of God? Which have not? What does God want to say to you about both? ...
5. Ask for forgiveness for failures/omissions, for healing from their effects ...
6. Look forward to the following day, and plan concretely with God how to live it according to God's desire for your life ...

Greeting from the Open and Affirming Team

It has been over a year since we began the stay at home precautions due to Covid. We have greatly missed our church family. Last year we had just started to have conversations with our fellow members to listen to your thoughts and concerns around the Open and Affirming process. Due to Covid, we were not able to continue the one-to-one conversations, and we stopped our team meetings as well.
