Scripture Reading: Luke 4:14-30, pp. 835-836

Then Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

‘The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,
because he has anointed me
to bring good news to the poor.
He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives
and recovery of sight to the blind,
to let the oppressed go free,
to proclaim the year of the Lord’s favor.’

And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, ‘Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.’

All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, ‘Is not this Joseph’s son?’ He said to them, ‘Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, “Doctor, cure yourself!” And you will say, “Do here also in your home town the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum.”’ And he said, ‘Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophet’s home town. But the truth is, there were many widows in Israel in the time of Elijah, when the heaven was shut up for three years and six months, and there was a severe famine over all the land; yet Elijah was sent to none of them except to a widow at Zarephath in Sidon. There were also many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed except Naaman the Syrian.’ When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with rage. They got up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. But he passed through the midst of them and went on his way.

Psalm 71

Psalm 71 requires a great deal of its readers. The psalm moves back and forth between petition and the expression of trust, and that movement seems to add to the urgency of the prayer. The prayer comes in three identifiable sections (vv. 1-8, 9-13, and 14-24), each containing both petitions and expressions of hope. Enemies also appear in each section. The psalm's final section moves to a greater emphasis on hope. The psalm is a prayer for help from an individual "I" who is portrayed as elderly, is pursued by enemies, and is likely ill.

The petitioner in Psalm 71 has been taught for a lifetime that God delivers and creates a community that makes possible wholeness of life. It is in this covenant relationship that the speaker trusts and hopes. The petition is that God will bring to fruition precisely these covenant promises that the faith tradition has taught, integrating lived experience and the received faith tradition.

This speaker has had a long-standing relationship with the covenant God and with the faith tradition. This petition is part of the honest dialogue that nurtures that relationship. The psalm expresses a genuine vulnerability and fear of being forgotten and left to the mercy of bloodthirsty enemies.

The great fear is to be forsaken by God and thus left without options. God is the one who initiates a relationship with "deeds of saving," so all depends on this God. The psalm is clear that there is trouble in life and that trouble is pressing, but the context of the petition is still hope and faith, crafted over a long life.

Daily Awareness Reflection²

At the end of the day, I've been asking myself the following questions. I jot down the answers and ask them again the next evening. I've found it helps me to remain centered as well as increasing my awareness of God in my life. It takes about 10 minutes.

1. Slow down. Stop. Prepare yourself to pray by becoming aware of the love with which God looks on you ...
2. Note the gifts God has given you today. Give thanks to God for them ...
3. Ask God that this be a time of special grace and revelation ...
4. With God, review the day. Look at the stirrings of your heart, your thoughts, and your choices as the day progressed. Which have been of God? Which have not? What does God want to say to you about both? ...
5. Ask for forgiveness for failures/omissions, for healing from their effects ...
6. Look forward to the following day, and plan concretely with God how to live it according to God's desire for your life ...
