Leader: Let me be like trees that have been transplanted where they have all the rich resources they need,

Leader: The wicked are rootless, they have no connection to the true source of life, they are so easily blown away in a community that works together.

All: Zero in on me and the path I am walking, O LORD. Keep me moving always toward you. Amen.

¹ In Hebrew, the first verse of Psalm 1 begins with the first letter of the Hebrew alphabet and the last verse begins with the last letter. So in my riff, I offered a nod to the idea that the whole world and all of wisdom can be encompassed in a prayer.

Psalm 1

Psalm 1 is placed at the beginning intentionally to set the tone for the entire collection. It announces that the primary agenda for our worship life is obedience, to order and conduct all of life in accordance with God's purpose and creation. The fundamental contrast of this psalm is a moral distinction between righteous and wicked, innocent and guilty, those who conform to God's purpose and those who ignore those purposes and disrupt the order. Human life is not mocked or trivialized. How it is lived is decisive.

The structure of the psalm reflects the unambiguous structure of life as the tradition of obedience understands it. There is no middle ground, no neutral ground. Either be a happy person who enjoys obedience to God's law and avoids alternative enterprises (vv. 1-2), or be like the wicked who refuse such delight (v. 4). Either end up like a luxuriant tree with plenty of nourishment (v. 3), or be like chaff which disappears (v. 4). Life consists of choices which are not obscure (vv. 5-6). There will be a judgment. One can stand or one can perish. But either way, it will be on the terms of the Creator. The connection between devotion and destiny is not negotiable.

Psalm 1 does not bargain or allow for ambiguity. It is the voice of a community that is familiar with risks, dangers, costs, and boundaries. It fully appreciates the givenness of God's world and has confidence that obeying God's law is the only thinkable response to the givenness of creation.

Psalm 1 expects a great deal. The psalms that follow bring that ideal into contact with the real world. But by the end of the book of Psalms, the community's obedience has brought it to joyful praise of God's loving kindness.

Questions for Reflection

One commentator on Luke 6:17–26 writes, “‘Blessed’ (*makarios*) does not simply describe a state of happiness or bliss. Rather, it refers in a theological sense to one’s standing before God (Deut. 33:29; Pss. 1:1; 40:4).” As you reflect on the blessings and woes in Luke’s Gospel and on the use of the word “happy” in Psalm 1:1 and “blessed” in Jeremiah 17:7, how does this meaning of “blessed” or “happy” contrast with contemporary uses of this word, even by some preachers? What is one change you can make in your own life before God that would bring you into closer accord with Jesus’ understanding of blessedness?

Daily Awareness Reflection³

At the end of the day, I’ve been asking myself the following questions. I jot down the answers and ask them again the next evening. I’ve found it helps me to remain centered as well as increasing my awareness of God in my life. It takes about 10 minutes.

1. Slow down. Stop. Prepare yourself to pray by becoming aware of the love with which God looks on you ...
2. Note the gifts God has given you today. Give thanks to God for them ...
3. Ask God that this be a time of special grace and revelation ...
4. With God, review the day. Look at the stirrings of your heart, your thoughts, and your choices as the day progressed. Which have been of God? Which have not? What does God want to say to you about both? ...
5. Ask for forgiveness for failures/omissions, for healing from their effects ...
6. Look forward to the following day, and plan concretely with God how to live it according to God’s desire for your life ...
