**Scripture Reading: Luke 9:28-43a, p. 843**

Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah'—not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!' When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

On the next day, when they had come down from the mountain, a great crowd met him. Just then a man from the crowd shouted, 'Teacher, I beg you to look at my son; he is my only child. Suddenly a spirit seizes him, and all at once he shrieks. It throws him into convulsions until he foams at the mouth; it mauls him and will scarcely leave him. I begged your disciples to cast it out, but they could not.' Jesus answered, 'You faithless and perverse generation, how much longer must I be with you and bear with you? Bring your son here.' While he was coming, the demon dashed him to the ground in convulsions. But Jesus rebuked the unclean spirit, healed the boy, and gave him back to his father. And all were astounded at the greatness of God.

**A Prayer to Send us Back Out into the World (today's riff on Psalm 99)**

**Leader:** God reaches out to the whole world, a ruler to care for everyone.

**All:** **Let everyone know that God is set apart, not *from us* but *with us*, unlike any earthly ruler.**

**Leader:** Free us from the smallness of our concept of justice

**All:** **Transform us into people who can practice true equality and fairness.**

**Leader:** Unite all of us to worship in the true temple of God, caring for each other and the creation God gave us.

**All:** **God heard Moses and Aaron and Samuel praying and answered their prayers. Let us open our hearts to serve God in the same way.**

**Leader:** Let us imagine again life with God as king, a life centered on the honest dialogue of faith and a community based on justice and mercy.

**All:** **Forgive us our wrong doings, O God, and avenge those who have wronged us.**

**Leader:** Help us to remember and imagine what is possible in this world.

**All:** **Help us to expand our relationship with the Lord our God who is so holy and beyond description.**

### **Psalm 99**

The hymn begins with the enthronement formula “The LORD is King.” The correct response is cosmic trembling, since this king shakes loose all old forms of governance.

The celebration of God’s kingship is articulated in verses 1b-5. This section of the psalm nicely interweaves the two basic traditions of Israel. On the one hand, there is the Jerusalem tradition of God’s presence and attentiveness to the Israelite establishment. On the other hand, there is the Mosaic tradition of liberation, which is expressed as agent of “equity, justice and righteousness” for radical social transformation. The kingship of God combines the assurance of presence and the abrasion of liberation, refusing to let us choose between these accents.

Verses 6-7 link God’s kingship more decisively to the oldest tradition of Moses and Aaron, referring to the wilderness sojourn and to the Sinai commandments. Samuel is remembered as the one who insisted on the kingship of God in order to resist all human kings, whom he regarded as pretenders and as threats to and diminishment of the kingship of God.

The last element of the psalm (vv. 8-9) states the two-sidedness of this awesome kingship: God forgives, and God punishes. The juxtaposition is resolved in verse 9 with one more summons to worship. This is a call to the temple, for God’s overriding characteristic is holiness. The temple provides the means and opportunity for a meeting with the holy one. God’s enthronement makes holy presence accessible and makes righteous will more urgent. Neither emphasis can be minimized without distorting who this ruling one is.

### **Questions for Reflection**

Look at Luke 9:35: "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" Where have you heard words like these before in the Gospels? (Hint: see Luke 3:22.) Where have you heard words like these in your own life? When have you had a strong sense of being chosen, claimed, and called by God? How have you responded?

### **Daily Awareness Reflection<sup>3</sup>**

At the end of the day, I've been asking myself the following questions. I jot down the answers and ask them again the next evening. I've found it helps me to remain centered as well as increasing my awareness of God in my life. It takes about 10 minutes.

1. Slow down. Stop. Prepare yourself to pray by becoming aware of the love with which God looks on you ...
2. Note the gifts God has given you today. Give thanks to God for them ...
3. Ask God that this be a time of special grace and revelation ...
4. With God, review the day. Look at the stirrings of your heart, your thoughts, and your choices as the day progressed. Which have been of God? Which have not? What does God want to say to you about both? ...
5. Ask for forgiveness for failures/omissions, for healing from their effects ...
6. Look forward to the following day, and plan concretely with God how to live it according to God's desire for your life ...
