**Call To Worship, Psalm 27, a Psalm of David**

**Leader:** The LORD is my light and my salvation;  
whom shall I fear?  
The LORD is the stronghold of my life;

### **Prayer of Consecration (Psalm 27)**

O God, our light and salvation, you are our stronghold, keeping us safe from fear. Nothing is hidden from you, and you make no barriers for human understanding. ## **A Prayer to Send us Back Out into the World (a riff on Psalm 27)**

Leader: When life asks me to choose between trust and fear, I'm picking to trust in the LORD.

**All: Because God has my back and will trip up the bullies.**

Leader: No matter what the world throws at me, I'll stand confident, trusting in God, as I have always done.

**All: When you strip away all the other yearnings – work, pleasure, money – there is only one thing I long for, God's beautiful presence in my life and community.**

Leader: In times of peril, I hide beside God, in God's home and tent or wherever God puts me,

**All: Victorious, I'll hold my head up high and offer grateful gifts, including music, to God**

Leader: And when life catches up with me, and the fear comes crashing in again, as it always does, I'll cry out to God, asking to once again to be in the presence of God, face to face.

**All: Even if the rest of the world has turned me away, God won't forsake me, a faithful servant.**

Leader: When lies further tear apart my community, God will set me on the straight and narrow. God won't let the enemies of truth and trust win.

**All: I will see God in the good life I live here on this sweet earth. God has promised an alternative to the broken mess of this world. That promise and that alternative is reliable and will endure until it comes into fruition. I will wait. I will hope. I will trust. Amen.**

## Psalm 27

Psalm 27 urges trust as an alternative to anxiety or fear, even the face of an urgent threat. The poem calls on various images to urge that trust: light, salvation, refuge, and shelter coming from God in the face of threats. It is not an alternative to denial, for the presence of trouble and woe are front and center in the psalm. Such trust is nurtured in worshiping communities. Psalm 27 concludes with the imperative “wait for the Lord.” This waiting is not a passive, anxious waiting but an active waiting. Perhaps we could paraphrase it as hoping and believing that the covenant God will act as the one who delivers and blesses in the present troubling crisis and thus makes possible a way forward. The psalm, time and again, comes back to the temple and the divine presence there as central to its affirmation of trust. In worship, the community of faith is shaped and molded. In worship, the encounter with the life-giving divine presence brings the renewal that makes it possible to face opposition. The threat in Psalm 27 is from enemies, but a loss of trust is also a threat. Trust is not a private affair but needs the renewal and the nurture that comes from the encounter of the divine in worship.

Psalm 27 recognizes the power of language in nurturing trust and also in nurturing fear or anxiety. In one sense, the question the psalm presents is, in which language will we put our trust – the language of trust or the language of fear? The false accusers feed anxiety and fear. The true worshiping community embraces the psalm’s first verse, and in the face of opposition, confesses trust in the Lord as “my light and my salvation.”

## **Questions for Reflection**

In Luke 13:35 Jesus says, “And I tell you, you will not see me until the time comes when you say, ‘Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.’” To what sort of “seeing” does Jesus refer? Is Jesus calling for more than a verbal declaration that he is the Messiah? How might I live so that I become a testimony that Jesus is truly the one who comes in the name of God?

## **Daily Awareness Reflection<sup>3</sup>**

At the end of the day, I’ve been asking myself the following questions. I jot down the answers and ask them again the next evening. I’ve found it helps me to remain centered as well as increasing my awareness of God in my life. It takes about 10 minutes.

1. Slow down. Stop. Prepare yourself to pray by becoming aware of the love with which God looks on you ...
2. Note the gifts God has given you today. Give thanks to God for them ...
3. Ask God that this be a time of special grace and revelation ...
4. With God, review the day. Look at the stirrings of your heart, your thoughts, and your choices as the day progressed. Which have been of God? Which have not? What does God want to say to you about both? ...
5. Ask for forgiveness for failures/omissions, for healing from their effects ...
6. Look forward to the following day, and plan concretely with God how to live it according to God’s desire for your life ...
